Turkey jails 17 suspects over deadly Istanbul attack

ISTANBUL: A Turkish court Friday ordered the detention of 17 suspects, including a Syrian woman, for alleged links to a bombing that killed six people in central Istanbul, local media reported. The government has accused the outlawed Kurdistan Workers' Party (PKK), designated as a terror group by Ankara and its Western allies, for last Sunday's attack. The victims included two girls aged nine and 15. The PKK and its Syrian offshoot YPG have denied involvement. No individual or group has claimed responsibility for the attack. Turkish police captured the chief suspect Alham Albashir — a Syrian woman who is said to have been working for Kurdish militants — in an Istanbul suburb. Albashir has reportedly confessed to planting the bomb during her interrogation. The Istanbul court remanded 17 suspects in pre-trial de-

tention on charges of "destroying the state's unity", "deliberate killing" and "deliberately attempting to murder", the Anadolu news agency reported. Albashir said she joined the PKK because of her boyfriend's influence and maintained her ties to the group after she broke up with him, the agency said. The attack was the deadliest in five years and evoked bitter memories from a wave of nationwide bombings from 2015 to 2017 that were blamed mostly on Kurdish militants and Islamic State jihadists. Turkish media revealed many details about the woman but questions still remain. She reportedly crossed into Turkey illegally from Afrin near the border, which is controlled by Ankara-backed groups. There have also been questions also how the woman rented her apartment in Istanbul.

NK fires suspected intercontinental ballistic missile, lands near Japan

SEOUL: North Korea fired a suspected intercontinental ballistic missile (ICBM) on Friday that landed just 200 kilometres off Japan and had sufficient range to reach the mainland of the United States, Japanese officials told Reuters. The launch — reported by both South Korean and Japanese officials — comes a day after a smaller missile launch by the North and its warning of "fiercer military responses" to the US boosting its regional security presence. This has become a record-breaking year for the nuclear-armed country's missile programme after it resumed testing ICBMs for the first time since 2017 and broke its self-imposed moratorium on long-range launches as denuclearisation talks stalled. Japanese Defence Minister Yasukazu Hamada told reporters that the latest missile was

capable of flying as far as 15,000km. Chief Cabinet Secretary Hirokazu Matsuno said that it flew to an altitude of about 6,000km with a range of 1,000km, before landing in the sea roughly 200km west of Oshima-Oshima Island in Hokkaido. North Korea often conducts its tests on such "lofted" trajectories where the missile flies much higher into space but to a shorter distance than it would if fired on a normal trajectory. Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida said there had been no reports of damage but the North's repeated missile launches could not be tolerated. Misawa Airbase — which hosts both Japanese and US troops — briefly issued an order to seek cover, according to a post on the base's Facebook page. North Korea's last suspected ICBM test was on Nov 3, when it fired multiple missiles

into the sea in what it said was a protest against allied military drills by South Korea and the US. Friday's launch would be the eighth ICBM test this year by North Korea, based on a tally from the US State Department. ICBMs are North Korea's longest-range weapon and are designed to carry a nuclear warhead as far as the continental US. — Reuters

ASIA SHOULD NOT BECOME ARENA FOR 'BIG POWER CONTEST': XI
BANGKOK: The Asia-Pacific is no one's backyard and should not become an arena for a big power contest, China's President Xi Jinping said in written remarks on Thursday, calling on the world to reject any cold war mentality. "No attempt to wage a new cold war will ever be allowed by the people or by our times," Xi said in remarks prepared for a business event on the sidelines of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) summit in Bangkok, which he had to withdraw from due to his meetings schedule. "We should follow a path of openness and inclusiveness," he said in the speech, which was provided by organisers, adding the region should not turn into "an arena for big power contest." North Korea fired a short-range ballistic missile as Xi and Japanese Prime Minister Fumio Kishida prepared to meet, and warned Washington and its allies to expect a "fiercer" military response. "Unilateralism and protectionism should be rejected by all; any attempt to politicise and weaponise economic and trade relations should also be rejected by all." The APEC meeting follows a series of regional summits so far dominated by geopolitical tension over the war in Ukraine. Russia is a member of both G20 and APEC but President Vladimir Putin has stayed away from the summits. First Deputy Prime Minister Andrey Belousov will represent him at APEC. Xi, Kishida meet as N. Korea fires missile The leaders of China and Japan held their first face-to-face talks in three years on Thursday, after North Korea fired the latest in a record missile blitz that has sent nuclear fears soaring. The pair met on the sidelines of a summit of the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation (APEC) forum focused on pandemic recovery and the global economic turmoil unleashed by the war in Ukraine. —Agencies

Saudi crown prince immune from Khashoggi suit: US govt

DUBAI: The US government recommended on Thursday that Saudi Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman was immune from legal action over the 2018 murder of a dissident journalist, according to court documents. Prince Mohammad was named prime minister by royal decree in late September, sparking suggestions he was looking to skirt exposure in cases filed in foreign courts — including a civil action brought in the US by Hatice Cengiz, fiancée of slain columnist Jamal Khashoggi. The killing four years ago of Khashoggi, a Saudi insider-turned-critic, in the kingdom's Istanbul consulate temporarily turned Prince Mohammad — widely known as MBS — into a pariah in the West. His lawyers previously argued that he "sits at the apex of Saudi Arabia's government" and thus qualifies for the kind of immunity US

courts afford foreign heads of state and other high-ranking officials. The US government had until Thursday to offer an opinion on that matter, if it chose to offer one at all. Its recommendation is not binding on the court. "The United States respectfully informs the court that defendant Mohammed bin Salman, the prime minister of the Kingdom of Saudi Arabia, is the sitting head of gov-



ernment and, accordingly, is immune from this suit," read the submission to the US District Court for the District of Columbia, from the administration of US President Joe Biden. But it added that "the Department of State takes no view on the merits of the present suit and reiterates its unequivocal condemnation of the heinous murder of Jamal Khashoggi". The recommendation sparked fury among supporters of Cengiz's action, including representatives of Democracy for the Arab World Now (DAWN), the US-based NGO that Khashoggi founded. "The Biden admin went out of its way to recommend immunity for MBS and shield him from accountability," said Media's executive director Sarah Leah Whitson. "Now that Biden has declared he's got total impunity, we can expect MBS' attacks against people in our country to escalate even further." —AFP
